Compared with other regions of the world, Asia is relatively peaceful, in that is free of major interstate wars and internal conflicts. Much of the area is also relatively prosperous and enjoys high rates of economic growth. While East Asian political systems are characterized by diversity, failed states and states in danger of collapse are notably absent.

This symposium seeks to further our understanding of the situation in the region by looking at East Asian history from the perspectives of international relations and state-building. This approach will allow us to shed light on how events in international relations and relationships among states have shaped societies and the frameworks of individual state, and come to a more dynamic understanding of Asian history in the 20th century, beyond examining each state-building process as self-contained dynamics.
